Hugh White Papers

Letters found in workroom, added to the collection, 5/61. They were apparently not previously listed.

December 1, 1860 - Hugh White to son - tells about visit, in Springfield, to Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln. Visit kept on strictly social plane and politics never entered the conversation.

December 15, 1860- Hugh White to son - from Cohoes, mentions Mohawk River Mills vs. John Knowles case (in which White is involved); says he would like to see the secessionist matter treated justly and according to the constitution rather than in the manner of the hot-tempered Unionists; some personal family matters.

These letters were in the accession folder but neither listed or described [John P. Lewis letters]. Lewis was the attending doctor at time of White, Sr's death.

April 2, 1827 - J. P. L. to Hugh White - notifies White of death of White, Sr. - tells what has been done so far with estate and asks if Hugh can come down or at least write instructions as to what should be done.

April 24, 1827 - J. P. L. to Hugh White - tells of White, Sr's. burial in Presbyterian churchyard as no religious sentiments were expressed before death.

Feb. 21, 1828 - J. P. L. to Hugh White - refers to collection of bond for money still owing on property sold by White, Sr. before his death; some personal remarks.

WINNEBAGO MISSION STATIONS - Eight letters regarding requests for
Catholic priests to teach the Indian children

June, 1845 - Letter addressed to H. White, Washington, D.C. Thomas A.B. Boyd, Justice of the Peace, testifies in writing that he attended General Dodge's conference with the Indians in the month of June, 1845, and heard a chief of the Winnebagos ask in behalf of the tribe that Catholic priests be permitted to teach the children.

June, 1845 - The Rev. F.J. Bonduel testifies in writing that he was present at the annual conference held by the Governor of Wisconsin Territory with the Chief and heads of the Winnebago Nation. The conference was held in Iowa Territory. Way-Kan-Haw-Kan, Indian orator of the tribe, asked Gov. Henry Dodge for Catholic clergymen as teachers for their children. He also asked that the Rev. Cretin and the Rev. Bonduel be given seats at the Council. This request was granted. Sworn before Brisbois, J.P., Crawford Co., Wis.

July, 1845 - Leonard Alexander testifies before H. Baldwin, J.P., that the Winnebago mission stations are operating Wiskey Bands participated in by the American staff and some of the educated Indians, among them "Little Hill." Alexander writes that the Indians, Little Hill excepted, request a Catholic priest instead of the missionaries. He adds that a carpenter and laborer at a Winnebago sub-station was discharged by Major Dearborn and Capt. Sumner for giving advice and counsel to the Indians.

April 21, 1846 - Remegius Patriot testifies to David Smith, J.P., that Gov. John Chambers of Iowa Territory ordered him out of the territory. (Richard Seal, Clerk of Galena Co., Ill., testifies to the status of David Smith, J.P.)

April 21, 1846 - DuBuque - The Rev. Joseph Cretin writes to H. White that he wishes permission to teach the Catholic children attending the Winnebago school with the same priveleges granted to the Protestant school.

April 28, 1846 - David Olmstead testifies in writing regarding the method of conducting the Winnebago school (Wis. Terr.), stating that the school is not improving either the intellectual or the moral character of the Indians. Repeats that the Indians want a Catholic priest.

April 30, 1846 - Letter to H. White. Olin Chemier testifies that in the summer of 1842 Mr. Patriot, a Catholic priest, was at the home of Antoine Grignon in a Winnebago mission in Iowa Territory. Grignon was in the employ of Hercules L. Dorisman of the American Fur Company. The Rev. Mr. Cretin was asked by Dorisman to have the priest leave on the premise that Dorisman would have trouble with the sub-agent Laury. Sworn before H. Baldwin, J.P.

May 25, 1846 - Letter to H. White states that the Rev. S. Laury is the new teacher at the Mission Station. Col. J.C. Learned, now in St. Louis, wants a newspaper that contains information on "that matter."

as treasurer for Whig campaign funds in New York and the nation, numerous letters requesting all types of patronage, letters relating to improvement of Hudson River navigation and the tariff, material relating to White's investigation of conditions of education among the Winnebagoes, papers relating to the investigations into the accounts of vessels used to transport troops to Mexico by the Committee of Public Expenditures of which White was the chairman, and reports by the committee, letters from James Buchanan (1845-1846), Gales & Scaton (1845-1846), William L. Marey (1845-1847), R. J. Walker (1847), John Chambers (1845), T. Butler King (1847), letters from William E. Seward (1846) protesting congressional treatment given White and himself for abusing their franking privileges, and commenting on the Locofocos, the Oregon question, and the President, letters from John W. Taylor (1845) commenting at length upon political tendencies, letters from William J. McAlpine (1845-1853), one of which defends his conduct as dock master in Brooklyn, a letter from Horace Greeley (1867), and a letter from Joseph Smith (1867) comparing Weed and Greeley. In a heavy run of letters (1850-1869) to his son, White constantly comments on political events and tendencies, and advises William Mansfield how to enter and succeed in a political career. Desirous of a political appointment, White visited Abraham Lincoln after the latter's election. On December 1, 1860, he wrote from Springfield that he had spent two evenings alone at home with the Lincolns, "but not one word of policy public or private was discussed or mentioned, no advice asked & none offered, but just such a visit as one would make to an old friend & acquaintance." A letter of December 15th contains additional descriptive information.

The papers relating to Hugh White's life at Hamilton College and to his study of the law with Charles G. Haines are few in number. The considerable number of papers relating to the cement business at Chittenango (1823-1840) and at Greenkills near Kingston (1840-1847) throw light on the difficulties of manufacturing, the inadequacies of canal transportation, and the heavy competition. They include timber, quarry, barrel, and cement accounts and contracts, canal boat clearances, a series of reports from agents, managers, and construction superintendents, J. L. Faulkner (1828-1840), William Lawrence (1826-1830), P. M. Warmen (1840-1846), and from L. William Mansfield (1839-1847) who traveled throughout the East making contracts, and other material.

Included also among the papers relating to Hugh White are subscription lists (1819) for the Oneida Agricultural Society, the same (1828) for the Chittenango Dutch Reformed Church, documents (1825-1860) relating to the incorporation and development of the Cohoes Company, papers (1834-1835) relating to a mortgage on Camden & Amboy stock held by Thomas Biddle & Company of Philadel-

phia, a letter (1847) relating to the problem of making steel in an iron works on Lake Superior, a patent with sketches (1842) for James MacGregor's sub-terrene mine, a list of the stockholders, the minutes, and other material (1849-1860) for the Rome and Utica Plank Road, letters (1845-1847) relating to the Syracuse & Utica Rail Road, accounts (1842-1865) for Baggs' Hotel in Utica, and letters (1853-1854) relating to the Michigan Southern & Northern Indiana Rail Road. Included also are letters from Washington Hunt (1847-1848), L. P. Hickok (1865-1866), and William E. Young (1852-1863). The account books relate largely to the handling and settlement of the Pierrepont, Van Wagenen, and White Estates by Hugh White, a grandson of the Honorable Hugh White, and by others.

The letters of various members of the Axtell, Duston, Lawrence, Mansfield, Mills, Niles, Porter, Van Wagenen, White, Young, and other related families are in long runs, cover most of the last century, and deal with a great variety of subjects. An unusual number of the runs are complementary. They describe life on a moving frontier from New York to Kentucky and Ohio, to Florida, Mississippi, Missouri, and California, and relate the hardships of developing a cotton plantation in Mississippi, a farm in Missouri, or a gold mine in California, show the settled life back in Connecticut or New York, and the wealth to be gained from investments in land, transportation, or manufacturing, and reveal the niceties of the Select Female Academy and the discipline at West Point. Above all they show the spread of a family across the continent and thus reflect American life and history. (610, 654)

WILLIAM PIERREPONT WHITE, ADDITIONAL PAPERS. 1801-1939. 864 pieces, 11 vols. The bulk of this collection relates to the disposal of Constable lands and the development of Pierrepont Manor, and includes statements of land contracts given by William Constable (1801-1810), an inventory of the Constable Estate (1829), a memorandum of journeys made by William Constable Pierrepont (1819-1829) to the Constable tract, a carpenter's journal and costs for the building of Pierrepont Manor House (1827-1829), crop and hay accounts with comparative costs (1827-1832), memoranda relating to agricultural experiments (1829), lists of bonds for Ellisburgh (1834-1841), Pierrepont Manor Land Office notices (1850's-1880's) lists of deeds, numbers 150 to 459 (1850-1866), and a series of letters (1853-1875) from Franklin B. Hough relating to life boats for Ellisburgh and Oswego, and to other matters. Among the account books are the cash books for the Pierrepont Manor Land Office (1833-1885), and a personal cash book for William Constable Pierrepont (1839-1862). 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ADDITIONAL HUGH WHITE ITEMS. 1791-1933. ⁶ boxes. Most of the items in this collection relate to the land business and interests of William Constable Pierrepont and supplement similar materials in the HUGH WHITE COLLECTION, the WILLIAM CONSTABLE PIERREPONT COLLECTION, and the WILLIAM CONSTABLE RECORDS (see 2nd and 3rd and 4th *Reports of the Curator*). They include John Campbell's survey book (1795) of Lot #4, Great Division, Macomb's Purchase, and contemporary copies of other Campbell surveys; survey books of Lord Holland's Patent (1791), Salter's Patent (1794), Scriba's Patent (1799, 1800), Fonda's Patent (1801-1818), and other patents; a number of Benjamin Wright's survey books (1801-1805) for the Constable Purchase; indentures, and leases and releases, numbered 3 to 8, for the Boylston Tract beginning with an indenture (1794) from Constable to Ward and ending with a release (1796) from John Johnson Phyn to Constable; a survey book (1796) of the 13 towns of Boylston, surveys of individual towns and resurveys (1831-1832) by Benjamin Hadley; a survey (1804) of Town #4 of Martinsburgh, and "Instructions for settlers on Martinsburgh." Benjamin Wright correspondence includes a letter (1801) from Theodorris Bailey, Whitestown, relating to the survey and sale of lands in Machin's Patent, and 3 letters (1807, 1817) relating to the sale of Curtenius lands in Scriba's Patent. Included also are 4 township books (1813-1822) with information as to the purchasers and surveys of their lots; William Constable Pierrepont's register (1840) of notes and due bills; and "Inventory of Orwell, 1861," which gives information as to land contracts for the township; a cash book (1882-1887) for land sales in the Towns of Orwell, Albion, and Lorraine; and a box of contracts, leases, and deeds (1847-1933) largely for Orwell. Other items are a record of the property holdings of G. H. Van Wagenen in the Town of Pierrepont; material relating to the reorganization of the Utica Drop Forge and Tool Company; 2 manuscript *mathematicae* (1818) and manuscript traverse tables of W. C. Pierrepont; the daily journal (1863) kept by Charles H. Cross, Pierrepont's agent in Pulaski; "Minutes [consisting of traverses and comments] taken to ascertain the practicability of improving the Navigation of the Oswego River," (1819); *Report of the Different Routes and Estimates of the Sacket's Harbor and Saratoga Rail-Road* by A. F. Edwards, (1853) [109 pp., map]; and *Remarks Addressed to the Jefferson County Agricultural Society in March, 1820*, presented to Pierrepont by the author, LeRay deChaumont, as he left for France in 1832. The 5 volumes of Pierrepont diaries included in this collection will be described in the next *Report* along with 28 additional Pierrepont diaries which were recently received by Regional History.
